

# **Executive Director's Report September 2025**

Elevator Lobbies: Marvin, an Eagle Scout candidate from Palatine Troop 209, finished up his Eagle project by painting the two parking garage lobbies. The bold geometric pattern he painted mirrors the shapes and patterns in our finishes, and the colors match the colors of the parking level. The refreshed lobbies have new paint, carpet, and elevators. We hope this helps them stand out and invite our visitors into the building.

**Parking Garage:** The parking garage will be closed again this month for a few days to finish the repair to the entry drain. Now that the concrete is fully set we will be adding a protective glaze.

RFID: Included in your packet is the final design for the Automated Materials Handler that will be installed with the renovation. The building and grounds reviewed the quote along with the current estimates for the entire project. The quote exceeds our budget, but it also includes five years of service. The committee is recommending we pay the full amount up front, which will save us \$45,000 over time. Staff have been busy tagging the collection with RFID tags; this process is anticipated to take a couple of months.




# Summer Reading Report

## **Executive Summary**


For the 2025 Summer Reading Program, readers Leveled Up at Palatine Library District. The versatile gaming theme was well received by members of the community, with a total of 5,107 registrations and 3,028 program completions across the branches. That is an increase of 54 people registering with a slight decrease in completions, at 39 less than the previous year. At the Summer Reading Kick-off Party, members participated in family bingo and crafts, as well as an entertaining balloon show from Smarty Pants. A highlight of the Kick-off Party was the retro arcade game stations which were generously funded by the Friends of the Library.



## **Registration Trends**


In terms of how members are signing up, 87.4% are still coming into the library to register. Only 11.5% register on their own via personal computer and 1% on mobile.

Adults still carry the majority of the registrations at 47%. The percentage of registrants from both the grades 3-5 and grades 6-12 categories remain rather equal at around 14% each. We saw a noticeable increase in registrations from the birth-grade 2 category, which jumped to 24.4% from only 18.9% in 2024.



### **Completion Rates**

In 2025 there was a 59.3% overall completion rate, which is down less than 2% from 2024.



#### Member Programs

This summer the Youth and Teen Services department hosted a variety of programs to go along with the Summer Reading theme, *Level Up*. Below were some of the fan favorites.



At the Kick-off Party, 1124 interactions took place with members participating in family bingo, arcade games and crafts. There was also a balloon show which was attended by 180 members.

## Make Your Oktoberfest Celebration Unforgettable

Millions of visitors travel to Munich, Germany, each year to take part in a celebration of Bavarian culture known as Oktoberfest. Although the name implies that the world's largest Volksfest (people's festival) occurs in October, the majority of Oktoberfest actually happens in September, and runs from between 16 and 18 days. For 2025, Oktoberfest begins Saturday, September 20 and runs through Sunday, October 5.

Though it may seem like Oktoberfest is just a beer festival, it's actually a celebration of community, food and music. The origins can be traced back to October 12, 1810, when Crown Prince Ludwig of Bavaria married Princess Therese of Saxony-Hildburghausen and the citizens of Munich were invited to celebrate the royal event outside of the city gates.

Whether one can trace his or her lineage to Germany or not, people of all backgrounds take part in Oktoberfest revelry, even hosting their own fests at home. The following ideas are some

These are the only official beer providers of Oktoberfestbier. People replicating Oktoberfest celebrations nearer to home can include beers by Augustiner, Hacker-Pschorr, Hofbrau, Paulaner, and Spaten-Franziskaner, and be sure to serve at least one Märzen-style lager at the celebration. Set up a beer tent with all of the beverages widely available for guests to enjoy.

Offer popular culinary delights
Beyond the bevy of beer available,
guests to an Oktoberfest celebration
will anticipate traditional and hearty
Bavarian specialities. Options include
hendl (roast chicken), schweinebraten
(roast pork), würstl (sausages), brezen
(pretzels), and many other culinary
delights. Side dishes like potato salad,
sauerkraut and red cabbage also are
popular.

Wear the right folk attire Traditional Oktoberfest attire includes lederhosen for men and dirndls for women. Lederhosen Alpine hats, Haferl shoes and Loferl socks.

#### Set the scene

Many people wonder why the official colors of Oktoberfest are blue and white, despite this not matching the colors of the German flag. In fact, Oktoberfest builds its color scheme around the Bavarian flag. Bavaria is a state within Germany. It is one of the 16 states that make up the Federal Republic of Germany, and it has its own traditions, dialect, cuisine, and more.



Play Oktoberfest music
Traditional Bavarian oompah bands,
polka bands and other sing-along
folk drinking songs are often played
during Oktoberfest celebrations. Each
style contributes to a festive atmosphere.
